Jessica: All right doctor. I will.



Should and Must

We use 'should' (should + verb 1) for advice:

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| A: I have a toothache. My tooth hurts. | B: You should go to your dentist. |
| A: I have an exam tomorrow. | B: You should study tonight. You shouldn't watch TV. |

We use 'must' for orders or very strong advice:

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| A: You must not drink alcohol and drive. |
| B: You mustn't drink cola. It's bad for your stomach. |
